in the state are responsible for the fiscal solvency of all school districts within their county. This includes maintaining and

that, firstly, trying to recover as much money as possible from the penalties that would be imposed for the lost school days and instructional minutes is crucial, and he is happy to hear that the District is working toward that. Secondly, he said it is important to continue to work, as has been talked about in the past, toward cutting expenditures in areas where it is known that the District is overspending or could do things more efficiently, such as the area of health benefits, which the District has been working on for a number of years. Thirdly, he said a long-term plan is needed and adhered to that does not depend on coming to a brink, exhausting all resources, and then trying to figure out how to add something more without having to make cuts.
